The last two newsletters have been about a significant financial gift Central received and the process we will use to discern how best to use this gift. We know that this gift will help us live into the future with confidence and new possibilities, but we want to prayerfully think about how this gift can have the most positive impact.

During the congregational meeting in March, members and friends were invited to complete two sentences.

- As the Session discerns how best to use this gift, please consider . . .
- I hope that Central . . .

It's not too late to offer input to the Session. Don't flood the ballot box, but the Session does want to incorporate best ideas and questions, so feel free to send them to office@cpcstpaul.org.

In my sermon on March 18, I talked a bit about a creative process we are using to get at the heart of who we are and who we want to be as a church. We've done an exercise with the staff, and with the session, that asks us to respond to kind of a silly question that asks if this church was a vehicle, what kind of vehicle would we be? And why do you think that?

I've loved hearing the answers that people have provided. And they do say a lot about how this church exists and how we imagine ourselves. Here are a few things we have heard:

- Central is like an old VW van. It's shows that it is from a different era, but it can hold a lot of people and it can go a lot of places and people look at it and think, "that is pretty cool." But it is expensive to maintain and there is no spot to recharge a smart phone.
- A couple of other people suggested that Central is like an old Rolls Royce. Again, from a different era, but classy. And the bones are good, even if the paint is fading and there are some dents and it has spent some Minnesota winters outside.
- Another person compared Central to the Tesla that was strapped on to a rocket heading to Mars. Playing David Bowie and with a message stamped onto the dashboard that says, "Don't panic." Exploring new dimensions, heading into the unknown.

With our new financial gift, a second question emerges along these same creative lines. If we could afford it, what kind of vehicle would we want it to be? Would

EASTER SUNDAY, APRIL 1

Festive music on this Resurrection morning will include the Ars Nova Brass Quintet, Central Choir, organ and percussion. Extended brass prelude music begins at 10:15 a.m. with worship at 10:30 a.m. Easter egg hunt for children follows worship.

On Palm Sunday, Rev. Colby's sermon was "Walking Together," and then on Maundy Thursday it was a more somber, "Walking Alone." On this Easter Sunday, Rev. Colby will preach on the story of Jesus appearing to two stunned disciples in his sermon, "On the Road Again."

SUNDAY, APRIL 8

Parish Associate and active participant in the Central community, Rev. Casey Wells will preach. John 20:19-31 tells us that week after Jesus's death and resurrection, he appeared disciples who were gathered together in a room with locked doors. But another disciple, Thomas, wasn't with them. "Doubting Thomas" did not believe their story that their beloved leader could reappear unless he saw Jesus and touched his wounded body. We will talk about when it might be important to check out our doubts and when to believe all that we read and hear.

Guitarist Eva Beneke will be performing, you can read about her on page 72.

SUNDAY, APRIL 15

Throughout the Gospel post-Easter stories, the disciples, Jesus' closest friends, have trouble understanding and believing that he has risen. In a passage from the Gospel of Luke (24:36-48) Jesus shows them the marks on his body to help the disciples trust him. Rev. Colby will preach on the this passage and extrapolate out to the marks of the church. Ars Nova Brass Quintet is back in worship along with the Central Choir

SUNDAY, APRIL 22

This popular contemporary Mass for the Earth features the Central Choir, a Children's Choir, a chamber ensemble, and the voices of wolf, whale, eagle, harp seal, Amazonian musical wren, and loon. It is a celebration of Mother Earth that integrates world music with songs from the wild to celebrate the whole earth as a sacred space.

Meet Eva Beneke, Guitarist

Eva will be joining Central during worship on Sunday, April 8. Born in Berlin, Germany, Eva Beneke began her studies at the Berlin University of Arts with Prof. Martin Rennert. Her success there led her to study with Prof. Thomas Müller-Pering, one of Germany's most influential guitarists. Eva received a doctorate with honors from the University of Southern California, Thornton School of Music where she studied with Scott Tennant, Pepe Romero and jazz-guitar legend Bruce Forman.

In addition to prizes at international guitar festivals in The Netherlands, Italy and the U.S., Eva Beneke is an internationally acclaimed soloist, chamber musician and published arranger. Her performances have been broadcast nationally and internationally on radio and television, such as NPR's "Performance Today", KUSC and Minnesota Public Radio. Highlights of her career include appearances with the German Symphony Orchestra under Kent Nagano, invitations to festivals in China, Peru,



Germany, Luxembourg, Lithuania, the U.S. and Canada, and a performance with Carrie Underwood at the 2010 American Country Music Awards.

Her 2012 album "In Dulci Jubilo - A Classical Guitar Christmas" is a duo-collaboration with Grammy®-winning guitarist Scott Tennant (L.A.G.Q.). Her latest album "The Complete works for voice and guitar by Fernando Sor" is a collaboration with mezzo-soprano Nerea Berraondo. Learn more about Eva on her website at www.evabeneke.com




