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# LIGHTS FOR LIBERTY

Jesus spent most of his time on earth traveling by foot. His ministry included encounters with people he met along the road. Jesus healed the sick, taught the disciples, ate with outcasts, played with children, and offered peace to those whom he met on the journey. After a while, people started walking with Jesus and walking to find Jesus - a minister who traveled by foot.

When he was near the sea of Galilee, a large group of people had walked and gathered to be near him. When his disciples saw the size of the crowd, they went to Jesus and said, "This is a desolate place, and the day is now over; send the crowds away to go into villages and buy food for themselves" (Matthew 14:15). Jesus told the disciples, "Some of them have come from far away" (Mark 8:3). And he instructed the disciples not to send the crowd away, but to take what they had and feed them. At the end of the meal, everyone was satisfied.

I think often about how Jesus was a walking healer. He didn't choose to stay inside or to travel to places of



importance. He traveled along the dirt path; the path that so many are being forced to take. And he stayed there with those he met and offered them what he could.

Today, there are crowds that have walked and journeyed to gather for peace and hope and freedom. Yet, when they arrive to their destination, it seems more likely for them to be turned away or detained.

One of the places where this is happening is right on our own United States border with Mexico.

Once families and individuals cross the border, they are placed in detention. The conditions are so

# COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

Last summer Central began a partnership with VocalPoint's recent beneficiary organization, Twin Cities R!se (or TCR) by becoming an internship partner.

TCR provides comprehensive employment counseling and personal empowerment through coaching, counseling, skills-development and internships. Participants underdo an 8-week career training program, followed by internships that give participants the opportunity to add stability and credibility to their resumes while demonstrating a strong work ethic to prospective employers. In cooperation with various organizations, TCR places eligible participants in real work environments for up to 20 weeks. In addition to completing duties assigned at their various work sites, all enrolled participants also meet as a class for one hour each week.

Since partnering with TCR, Central has had the opportunity to take on three custodial interns: Rick Dahl, Pat Cook (who, at the end of his internship, was hired as Central's current Sexton), and most recently, Lavar Jones who is soon completing his internship and moving on to other employment.

Having a custodian on-staff plus a custodial intern has allowed us to take on many more maintenance projects and repairs, which previously were hired out. From plumbing and electrical repairs, to painting projects and general cleaning, our interns have helped improve Central's building over the past year in many ways. The internship also gives them valuable job experience, builds their resume while they continue to search for full -time employment, and adds to their list of professional references.

It's been a privilege to work with each of the three intern that have come through TCR, and we look forward to continuing our partnership into the future.

abhorrent that lawmakers and journalists who have been able to visit are calling the centers "concentration camps." Children wear clothes caked with dirt and are caring for infants. Women in cells find their only access to water in a toilet. The overcrowding forces people to sleep on concrete. Access to basic nutrition and hygiene is denied.

It is difficult to know what to do to help in a time such as this, especially when it still feels far away from us. We live in Minnesota, the camps are in Texas and Arizona. On July 12, people gathered across the U.S. and world in vigil at detention camps to protest the inhumane conditions that asylum seekers face. And to show that even though we only hear about the conditions on the border, asylum seekers are being held in detention in every state in the U.S.

Folks from Central held vigil at 12 locations in Minnesota including with neighbors at Fort Snelling, where Immigration Court cases are heard, Ramsey County Adult Detention Center and with our neighbors in Elk River, where the Sherburne County Jail serves as the largest Immigration and Custom Enforcement (ICE) detention center in the state. This detention center has 120 beds and holds over 300

people, with at least 25% held without a criminal charge. There is a current proposal to expand this site to 500 beds with a 10 year contract.

Let our participation in Lights for Liberty and our frustration at the system serve as a catalyst. May we continue to listen and learn how best to use what we have to help others in the most meaningful and impactful way. Our neighbors are terrified for their lives. Some of them have come from far away. What would our God, who also traveled by foot, do?

# REV. COLBY'S INVOCATION AT THE PROMOTION OF BRIGADIER GENERAL HORVATH

Rev. Colby was honored to participate in a ceremony on July 9 which marked Stefanie Horvath promotion from Colonel to Minnesota National Guard Brigadier General. Quite a bit of publicity surrounded this ceremony, as Horvath is the Guard's first openly lesbian General. As a thirty-year veteran of the armed forces, she lived and served during a remarkable period of change from a long "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy to a new era in which diversity is more celebrated and appreciated.

Horvath and her family have worshipped at Central occasionally. With her permission, Rev. Colby once preached a sermon telling her story of having to return to duty abroad following the birth of twin daughters, unable to even talk about her family without risk of exposure.

The ceremony began with Rev. Colby's invocation as shown below.

Let me invite you to join me in prayer. We pause now in this promotion ceremony, Holy God, to give thanks and ask for your blessing.

We give thanks and ask your continued blessing upon Stefanie Horvath. We gather here not just because of her career and accomplishments, but to celebrate the many ways she has touched our lives with wisdom and courage and loyal support.

#### THE CENTRAL CHOIR

Who: Adults

What: An SATB Choir that sings in worship nearly every week, September – May. While reading music isn't required, this choir moves quickly, learns a lot of repertoire, and throughout the year sings some

challenging music (and also sings some more accessible music as well.)

When: Rehearsals are Wednesdays from 7:15 p.m. to 9:15 p.m.

We sing most Sundays, and usually gather at 9:30 a.m. for warm-ups and rehearsal.

#### STICKS AND STEEL 1

Who: Children grades 3 – 5

What: This is the entry-level group for our Percussion Ensemble. We will learn how to play various percussion instruments and hand chimes, and play in worship occasionally throughout the year.


