For many people across this country, December is an extra busy time. There are parties and concerts, shopping for the perfect gift, lots of activity getting ready for Christmas. For the church, we too get busy this month with all the preparations for special music, the pageant rehearsals, the decorating of the sanctuary.

If you take a step back from all the activity, all the emotions, the stress and even sadness this season can hold, Advent is at its center about waiting. Most of us are not good at waiting, and I don't just mean children waiting for their stocking on Christmas morning. There is a sense of expectation in so much of what we do this month, both in the church and outside of church.

Opening Doors to Food Security

The Hunger Task Force has made a donation from its Hunger Initiative Grant to Keystone Community Services for its capital campaign for a vital new Community Food Center in Ramsey County. It will be located on University Avenue, near Fairview, and would replace food shelves on Rice Street and in the Midway. Fundraising continues with anticipated opening to occur sometime in 2023.

Why the change?

Simply put, the current food shelves are very small. Added space is needed to provide even more services to a larger number of people in need. The renovated space of 20,000 square feet will offer a large market area for people to select free food and household items; increased capacity to receive and warehouse

food; private meeting space for crisis assistance; and large volunteer space to handle all of Keystone's food programs and increased group volunteering. Keystone is the largest provider of food shelf services in Ramsey County.

Central's Supportive Relationship

Central's Hunger Task Force has supported Keystone Community Services over the years with many food shelf drives. In 2020, Keystone's Express Bike Shop was the recipient of funding from VocalPoint's annual benefit concerts, which raised over \$22,000 for its youth employment program.

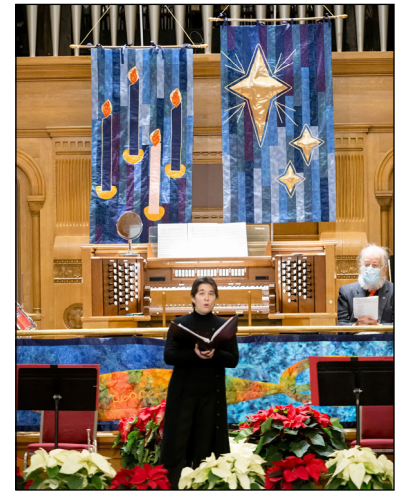

Anti-Racism Task Force Travels to St. Peter

The Anti-Racism Task Force led a field trip to St. Peter, MN on October 22, to visit the Treaty Site History Center. It featured an award-winning exhibit about the Treaty of Traverse des Sioux, which was signed there in July of 1851, ceding 24 million acres of Dakota land to the U.S. government.

After viewing an excerpt of the video produced by Twin Cities Public Television, *Dakota Conflict*, the group of twelve from Central explored history through large graphic panels, hands-on activities, and artifacts. We learned how the treaty came about, including the story of how white intermarriage with the Dakota community led to enormous influence on signing of the treaty - along with how cultural differences played a role, like "land ownership," a concept foreign to Indian beliefs. Promises to the Dakota community



which were broken were portrayed.

Some quotes magnified in the exhibit were horrifying, including one made by Thomas Jefferson, earlier in the century, "To promote this disposition to exchange lands which they have to spare and we want, for necessities, which we have to spare and they want, we shall push our trading houses and be glad to see the good and influential individuals among them run in debt, because we observe that when these debts get beyond what the individuals can pay, they become willing to lop them off by a cession of lands."

After touring the exhibit and walking outside on a historic Traverse des Sioux trail, our group trip concluded with a meal and rich discussion of

our engagement with history.

Central to Welcome Guest Organist, David Fienen

On Sunday, December 4, Central will welcome guest organist David Fienen to worship.

David is Emeritus Professor of Music at Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, MN. He retired in 2011 after 38 years as Cantor at Christ Chapel and Professor of Music. Recently, he served for two years as Provost and Dean of the College, having been Dean of Faculty and Vice President for Academic Affairs, Associate Dean of the College, and Director of General Education. He also served the College as Chair of the Faculty Senate as well as chair or member of several other standing committees of the faculty.

He has served as chair of the Music Department and the Edgar F. and Ethel Johnson Professor of Fine Arts. He received degrees from Indiana University, Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, and the University of Minnesota. He continues his active performance career in the United States and Europe. In addition to a solo recital tour through North Germany and Berlin, he has toured Central Europe with both the Gustavus Brass Ensembles and the Gustavus Wind Orchestra. He was an artist/fellow with the Bach Aria Festival and Institute at Stony Brook, N.Y.

Since 1988 he has been the keyboardist and occasional soloist with the Mankato Symphony Orchestra, was Assistant Conductor of the Mankato-based choral group



Musicorum, and has been the accompanist for Musicorum, Minnesota Valley Chorale, and occasionally for the St. Peter Choral Society. In July 2004, he played an Orgelvesper at St. Jacobi in Lübeck, Germany, and an organ recital at the Schlosskirche in Lutherstadt Wittenberg, Germany.

Dr. Fienen was secretary/treasurer of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians, having previously served as founding president of Region III, and as treasurer for three ALCM biennial conferences. He was on the executive board of the Twin Cities chapter of the American Guild of Organists, is treasurer for the 2023 North Central Regional Convention of the AGO, and was on the board

of directors and chair of the finance committee of The Collaboration for the Advancement of College Teaching and Learning.

He has recorded *Hymns and Fanfares* (with Gustavus Brass Ensembles) and *Let Us Adore Him; Favorite Swedish Hymns; and Favorite Norwegian Hymns* (with the Gustavus Choir), which are available from the Book Mark at Gustavus Adolphus College. He also appears as organ or harpsichord soloist and accompanist on three CDs produced by Musicorum. His current research is focused on the life and works of Jan Bender. He edited five volumes of organ works by Bender for Concordia Publishing House, published as a Commemorative Edition in 2005.

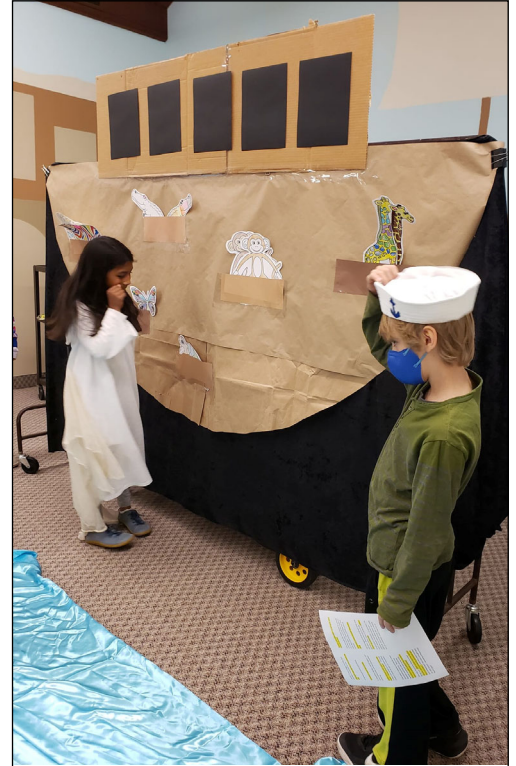

The topic, hosted by composer Catherine Dalton, was *Making Social Justice... Well, Social* and it explored how choirs can (and must) collaborate to do effective social justice work.

Central Receives Grant Award!

FROM FACILITIES MANAGEMENT & RISK ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE

Great news! We have been informed by the Minnesota Historical Society that Central has been awarded the grant for the next phase of building restoration in 2023!

Thank you so much for to all who donated to the *Buy a Brick* campaign earlier this year. Because of your generosity, we were able to raise just under \$30,000 which allowed us to pledge \$58,000 of matching funds from the Central community. We feel the competitive amount of matching funds was a significant factor in our success in receiving the grant.

The new grant is for a total of \$218,000 to rehabilitate the East side of our building. This will involve replacing damaged bricks in several areas, tuck pointing approximately 85% of the brickwork, tuck pointing and repairing the brownstone window sills, and sealing all the window frames. With funding secured from the Minnesota Historical Society and matching

funds from Central, work will begin in the spring of 2023 to restore and maintain our beautiful space for generations to come.
