A NEW CHAPTER BEGINS

A beloved college professor once said something that has stuck with me all these years. "The gospel always comes wrapped in flesh." Think about that for a moment: that the good news always comes mediated through real live flesh and blood and human minds and And with that emotions. incarnation, with that word taking on flesh, comes risk. The risk of something important being lost in translation. It has a bedrock requirement of sharing honestly, but with that there is a deep vulnerability. There is risk in revealing and communicating the truth as any one of us sees it.

I have come to love this church, and for so many reasons. Perhaps at the forefront for me is that this church has a long embrace of the freedom of the pulpit. To give your pastors the courage to take risks with images and analogies as we attempt to bring faith to bear on current affairs. The encouragement to speak out - even in tenuous times and especially on troubling topics. You encourage faithful-risk taking.

And now we have just installed the Reverend Ashley Bair in a position



of leadership. And I could not be more thrilled.

This position is borne out of creative risk-taking, a desire to have a larger impact, to really be in the city for good. And throughout the search process, as the nominating team gathered and prayed and asked questions and listened, over and over, they valued risk-taking over playing it safe, saying that is what this congregation needed. They valued a desire to think toward the

SUNDAY, JUNE 2

On June 9 and 16, Bible passages will explore the contrast between slavery and freedom and the gospel call to bold and faithful living. On June 2, we will be reminded of the pivotal story from Exodus, in which God hears the people cry from slavery and instructs Moses to go down and tell Pharaoh to let my people go. Then in Acts 16, we will hear a fascinating story from the early church in which the Apostle Paul and companions meet a woman who has been enslaved. As a result of their actions, they are thrown in prison.

We will celebrate the sacrament of communion and Rev. Colby will preach.

Join us on this Pentecost Sunday. Pentecost, thought of as the birth of the church and the coming of the Holy Spirit. Rev. Colby will preach and Central Choir is back for this special Sunday as we celebrate Pentecost and the baptism of Waverly Bergman (born to Leslie and James Bergman).

SUNDAY, JUNE 16

Rev. Ashley Bair will preach on Romans 5:1-5. Approximately 50 years after Jesus' death, Paul wrote a letter to the Christians in Rome, whom he had not yet met, to address the tensions between Christian Gentiles and Christian Jews. His letter was sent to insist that there is one gospel for all humanity. In chapter 5, we will read about the desire for hope in faith that Paul had for his Christian siblings living Rome.

Sticks and Steel returns to worship. This is our Percussion Ensemble for 3rd-7th graders. Come and support our young people as they share their gifts in worship.

SUNDAY, JUNE 23

Doug Throckmorton will preach What are Rules For? The writer of Galatians 3:23-29 spins this question around and all sorts of interesting ideas and insights come flying off, some of them very timely for how we think about living together today.

Doug Throckmorton, Pastor Emeritus of the White Bear Lake Presbyterian Church, is one of the retired ministers who finds a spiritual home here at Central and serves as one of our Parish Associates.

Taking up the mantle of leadership, Elisha becomes a key prophet as his mentor Elijah is taken up to heaven in a whirlwind. In these challenging times, where do we draw strength? MANAGING THE SUMMER HEAT AT CENTRAL

Summertime in Minnesota is glorious, with the sunny skies and warm air brightening our moods and our beautiful sanctuary at Central. But the heat can sometimes make our worship space uncomfortable, even unsafe, for those sensitive to extreme temperatures.

During the late summer months, when the temps are in the 90's, we will occasionally make the decision to move the Sunday worship service into the air-conditioned Friendship Room, for everyone's safety and comfort. While worshipping in the Friendship Room does provide unique opportunities for people to sit closer together, the room itself restricts our capacity and music capability, so the preference is to worship as often as possible in the sanctuary.

First, a brief history: Before the energy-crisis of the 1970's, Central

had a natural ventilation system. Large wooden ventilation shafts ran through the upper level of the building (alongside the old chapel), bringing outside air into the sanctuary near the dome. Many of the outer stained-glass windows could open, allowing air movement. Two vents in the cupola could be opened (or shut in winter), to allow hot air to escape. But with the need to conserve energy, and the remodeling of the old chapel, the vents on the upper level were removed: the windows in the sanctuary were bolted shut then covered with plexi-glass on the outside for insulation and protection. The cupola vents are still functional, and can be open and shut as the seasons change. But with no fresh-air-intake, the sanctuary can sometimes feel like And so, the Facilities an oven. Management and Risk Assessment Committee has been investigating the possibility of air-conditioning the sanctuary and receiving cost

estimates to do so.

In the meantime, we are working on several measures to get us through the next few summer months as temperatures continue to rise. One immediate and simple measure we will be taking is offering simple hand -held fans for people to use. We will also be replacing some of our current oscillating fans with newer, quieter Longer-term possibilities versions. include re-working the duct system to pull cooler air from the subbasement, or installing a chilledwater system. We'll be working with local utilities and contractors to further investigate how best to cool down our space, so we can continue to worship in the sanctuary throughout the summer.

We appreciate your patience as we continue to work to find affordable, efficient and effective solutions to cool this beautiful, but complicated, historic structure.

So let us continue to be bold and generous. Let us continue to seek to be excellent, and more importantly, faithful to the God who has big dreams for us. For we are trying to do something important. Something that I believe is



imperative. In a time when so many feel isolated and anxious and in need of hope, we are creating a compassionate community. Trying to be the church God wants and needs for this city and for this time.

There are people who are looking for a great pastor - I'm confident Ashley is that pastor. I'm also told that there are churches who look for a pastor to do everything on their own. That some churches elect someone to be their pastor and then want to sit back watch the ministry happen. That is not this church. We need to be the church we want to see in the world. And when we do that, it can be amazing. So let us be the church together. Together, let us be the change.

SOLOMON HAILE



FAITHFUL GENEROSITY FUELS OUR MINISTRY

"We are the church together".

The Apostle Paul writes, in a passage that we remember and recite when we ordain elders and deacons, that "there are a variety of gifts, but the same spirit." Paul is speaking about spiritual gifts such as wisdom, knowledge, and faith (1 Corinthians 12:1-12). But it is just a true that there are a variety of financial gifts that help make the church who we are and provides support for what we are doing. And there are a variety of ways to give.

First, no matter who we are, and what our financial abilities may be, being generous is part of an openhearted faithful life. So we encourage everyone to be generous. And while there are blessings in spontaneity, we know that being intentional about generosity is both a spiritual discipline and a helpful

budgeting practice.

Now that the tax filing season has ended, we are once again aware that we have a lot of smart givers within the Central community. And we are glad to work with you to help you give generously in ways that are most advantageous for the church and for you. What follows are some short descriptions of three different ways of giving that people use at Central.

Automatic monthly electronic transfers from your checking account. (See page 9.) Other non-profit organizations call people who donate this way sustainers and it makes sense. In recent years, about thirty percent of all our contributions were received this way, and it really helps sustain predictable cash flow throughout the year. (See next page for the form to set this up).

The 2017 tax law changes raised the annual automatic deduction. As a result some members of Central have discovered is that it makes sense to bundle multiple years of contributions into one tax year. If you do wish to pre-pay a pledge for a future year, please let the church treasurer know as you make this gift so that we can budget accordingly.

Another tax-advantaged way of giving is available to people who are older than 70 1/2 years and that is by donating IRA money to charities satisfying required minimum distributions and potentially lowering taxes at the same time.

'FOREVER EMBRACING' PREMIERS AT CENTRAL

Sunday, May 19 was an exciting one at Central. Not only did Central see the installation of Rev. Ashley Bair as our Associate Pastor, but it also premiered a new hymn by our composer-in-residence, Abbie Betinis - commissioned by Central Presbyterian Church in celebration of this season of rebirth.

This hymn was inspired by the church's beautiful new logo, which features a half-circle of stained-glass window-like elements which, depending on how you look at it, seem to either spiral inward to the center, or outward to the world. The music is composed to do just that.

In verse 1, high voices begin and low voices echo like a mirror (both coming in to the center), Verse 2 expands and reflects outward by reversing those high and low voices, then Verse 3 celebrates the continuity of the cycle by adding soaring descant so you can hear both the "coming in" and the "going out" at the same time.



In her artist's statement introduction of the hymn to Central, Abbie also had these words of thanks to share:

"Thank you to Ashley for helping me with this form and for recommending phrases that honor the work of the church. Thank you also to Jennifer, Steve, the choir, and congregation for making it come alive today. What a joy to try my hand at writing a hymn for this very important spiritual home to me!"

For those who have not yet heard this wonderful new hymn, we invite you to observe Abbie's design in her lyrics that follow:


