Care Packages for Our Neighbors

AUGUST 14

As a partnership with the Coordinated Missions Committee, the youth groups are going to be overseeing our "care packages" that we offer to our neighbors who come to Central asking for food, hygiene items, or winter items such as hats and mittens. During the weeks leading up to August 14, we will be asking for the following items to be donated:

Unopened small hygiene items:

This is a perfect time to grab those hotel items such as travel size soaps, toothpaste, toothbrushes, lotion, Kleenex packs, Chapstick, etc.

Reusable bags and backpacks: We find that nearly everyone who comes to Central asking for items also asks for a good bag to put it in. Canvas, nylon, etc. (Think of the bags that

you might get from donating to your favorite non-profit organizations. If you have an extra, consider donating it to this project!)

Winter gear: Hats, mittens, scarves, and socks! Warm socks (such as white athletic socks) are ALWAYS in need and a common item that goes overlooked when people donate.

Snack Items: Will be purchased with funds from the Hunger Initiative (granola bars, nuts, fruit snacks, etc.)

Together, after worship on August 14, all ages are invited to help assemble these care packages that we will keep on hand in the church office and give to people who are in need. Central's youth groups will continue this project on an ongoing basis. So, you can continue to donate hygiene items, bags, and winter gear throughout the year, and

its own and is living in its own in-between, liminal time.

By the end of the second chapter in Acts, we read that the believers had found a sense of purpose in worship, teaching, and mission. The passage mentions the numbers who were being added to their ranks, but I don't really think that head count was what mattered. It would be a very long time before people became organized as the church and even longer before churches became institutionalized with a building and staff. During the long in-between time, the believers would need to

depend on God and one another.

While change is hard and uncertainty is even harder, it is not all bad. In this in-between time that Central finds itself, there are opportunities to consider what it means to be the church and what to focus on going forward. And if this time of uncertainty about the future means growing closer to God, and to one another, that will be a blessing.

Spirit of God, filling our hearts with hope, steadying our nerves with

peace, comforting our lives with love;

Spirit of God, come to us now – surging through the darkness of our lives, sweeping over our weariness –

so that, in this time of Pentecost, the sparkling light of faith,

the rushing wind of hope and the joyful sound of praise

may echo round the world, may echo in the church, and find their response in us. Amen.

Lifeboaters (Middle Schoolers) are invited to sit together in the "Lifeboat" part of the Sanctuary.



FROM THE ANTI-RACISM TASK FORCE

My anniversary of joining the Anti-Racism Task Force at Central has just passed. Two years. We were living through history back then. We always are, of course, but at that time history loomed extra-large. The Task Force had been up and running for several months, the brainchild of people whose foresight had established the group as an outgrowth of the Coordinated Mission Committee.

A few short months later, we were in quarantine and George Floyd died, one of untold numbers of people of color to lose their lives to racism. The Task Force called the congregation together on Zoom. We raged and reflected, stunned and sobered at the enormity of the offense, wept and watched as our cities burned. We took a confessional stance in that moment, acknowledged that we have participated in great evils in this world, and vowed to be part of making it right. Change comes slowly, and at the same time tumbles down suddenly. The timing is God's, and we work to ready ourselves to be of use when the ripe occasion arrives.

There was - there is - so much work to do. Stories to be unearthed and freshened in the telling. Meanings to be surfaced and shared anew. Consequences to be faced as our excuses run thin. And, at least within our group, the growing awareness that we'd better settle in, because although "task force" sounds like a fleeting group with defined work to accomplish in the short-term, our



mission is unlikely to be realized within our lifetime.

We started out believing we could jump from one topic to the next as each new connection presented itself, and slowly realized we would implode without accomplishing much. Then we thought we could spend a few weeks or a few months on any one group or situation that revealed racism, and became frustrated with how little we could accomplish that way. We wanted to teach, and were surprised at how hard it was. We wanted to act, and discovered how much there still was to learn. We wanted authentic partners in our journey, and reached out, just a little, toward the people for whom we want to become solid allies.

We very nearly became paralyzed trying to decide whether to celebrate all the holidays or shine the light on all of the invisible histories, whether to provide the congregation with books to read or opportunities to lobby your legislator. But we continued to talk together and learned to trust each other. We

shared what we were experiencing in our various communities to live into our shared commitment to Anti-Racism.

And now it is two years and a few months later. We would not claim to know all the answers, of course; we are just getting started on asking all the questions! But we are settling in for the journey together, each of us finding our own place. We understand now the practice of pacing our work. We understand now the wisdom of saying "no" to some invitations so that the strength of our "yes" can thrive. And bit by bit, more of you are finding a place alongside us, to sing a song, read a book, make some art, ask a question, write a letter, explore a culture, act in faith.

Thank you for putting your trust in us. We love being your tour guides and worship leaders. We love having you respond to our invitations with curiosity and eagerness. We love having a time each month to talk about topics that are important to us. We love being your Anti-Racism Task Force! Thank you for the opportunity to serve the church and the world in this way.
