In late 2015, the Session received a letter from a church member asking what we were going to do about the global refugee crisis. We formed a Refugee Task Force to learn about the global situation, explore what other churches were doing, and think about how we could and should respond with faith.

We began to learn, sharing news articles that provided background on why there is a refugee crisis right now, and the specific and global dynamics that have created the crisis. We have wanted to learn from refugees who came to America and to Minnesota particularly. We screened a movie showing the experience of teenage boys from Sudan who had been forced to grow up way too fast when they were way too young, and their experience in coming to America. We hosted Minnesota author Kao Kalia Yang, who read from her new book about her father, *The Song Poet*.

Our learnings have informed our prayers and our music, with special anthems and hymns and even the children's 2016 Christmas pageant. The congregation took part in a denominational effort—inviting church members to pose for a group picture under a banner that read, "We Choose Welcome." And this Christmas season we had a banner out front that reminded us that Jesus and his family were also refugees (see page 3).

We were preparing to do what many good churches have done for decades: work with a great organization doing refugee resettlement to be assigned a family we could co-sponsor, providing hospitality and support. Months ago, we were told that there was a long wait list of co-sponsoring organizations, so probably it would be February 2017.

Issues around refugees and immigrants became polarizing political issues with the new administration. And our work to do what good churches have been doing for a long time drew media interest and found us exploring a hot-button political story from a very different angle. Our preparations were suddenly put on hold with a presidential executive order banning travel that put a halt to refugee resettlement, and then, just as suddenly, court orders were given that had the effect of us getting a green light to once again prepare to welcome a family.

We have some exciting late-breaking news: it looks like we have been assigned a refugee family and that this family will arrive on March 9! See page 3 for a story from the Refugee Task Force about the family and how you can be involved.

ASH WEDNESDAY, MARCH 1

On Ash Wednesday, we begin the season of Lent. We will have two services in the sanctuary. 12:30 and 7:30pm.

In the evening, all are invited to begin this season with a simple supper of soup and bread available at 6:45, and then join together in worship. David Winkworth will sing.

Sunday, March 5

We will share communion. Rev. Colby will preach, the choir will sing and we will hear from Melody Ward, the refugee program specialist at the Minnesota Council of Churches.

Sunday, March 12

During this season of Lent, we will hear some marvelous Psalms. Today we come to Psalm 121, "I lift up my eyes to the hills—from where will my help come?" Rev. Colby will preach and the choir will sing. The annual meeting of the congregation and **corporation** of Central Presbyterian Church will be held on Sunday, March 12 in the sanctuary immediately following worship. The annual meeting may consider such business as electing officers, hearing reports of the session along with plans for the coming year, hearing reports from the board of deacons and other organizations of the church, and transacting other business as appropriate. It shall review the adequacy of the compensation of the pastor upon report of the prior review by session. The Session will bring recommendations for amendments to the bylaws of the congregation and corporation.

Sunday, March 19

Psalm 95 begins, "O come, let us sing to the Lord!" Church is one of the few places where we can sing together.
Following worship, our Third Sunday Lunch.

Sunday, March 26

The 23rd Psalm has some of the most familiar and comforting words, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want . . . " Rev. Colby will preach and our children will be the choir this morning, singing 2 anthems. Shanta Hejmadi will provide leadership on the congregational hymns.

Sunday, April 2

The Central Choir presents Mozart's Requiem on April 2, with professional soloists and chamber orchestra, offering the beautiful words from the Requiem mass on the 5th Sunday of Lent. There will be a special children's activity during worship.



Welcoming a Refugee Family

After months of learning, prayer and conversations, Central decided to co-sponsor a refugee family through the Minnesota Council of Churches Refugee Resettlement Program. The goal of this program is to welcome persecuted persons from around the world into lives of freedom, hope, and opportunity in Minnesota.

What does it mean to be a co-sponsor?

Refugee co-sponsorship gives congregations and community groups the opportunity to welcome a refugee family to Minnesota. Co-sponsors assist new refugee families for their first four months in the US and help them on the path to self-sufficiency through a supportive partnership with MCC Refugee Services. By offering support to refugees, congregations live out God's call to welcome the stranger, and help transform a refugee's new country into a new home.

What do we know about the family we have been assigned?

On February 22, we were assigned a family from Afghanistan. This family knows only one other family here and that family has lived here less than 3 years. They are not a close connection, so community support is needed for them. The family is comprised of Dad, Mom (both 33), and 3 children (2 girls, ages 5 & 1; 1 boy, age 3). Dad was both an interpreter and a Construction Engineer with a Bachelor's of Science (not sure from where). Mom graduated from high school; they speak English, which is a great bonus. Dad also speaks Pashto, Dari, and Urdu.

When will the family arrive? On March 9!

We are a congregation that chooses Welcome. Doing so often requires us to put our faith in God; faith that we will find the skills, insights, and resources to do the work that needs to be done. Please keep reading to find out how you can help!

How can I help?

Sharing time and talents

We will have lots to prepare, and will continue to need broad support from the congregation. There are lots of different ways to provide hospitality and support. A good number of congregation members filled out forms February 12 to indicate their availability and areas of expertise. If you would like to fill out the form online, go to tinyurl.com/centralrefugees.

Some of the things that will be helpful:

- Providing rides to medical appointments
- Gathering clothing, housewares and furniture for the family
- Organizing social events to welcome the family

Donating money

As we prepare to welcome a refugee family in partnership with the Minnesota Council of Churches, there are many unknowns. One thing we do know is that we want to be able to help this family in ways that may require money from time to time. For example, we will need a few hundred dollars initially to access the services of a non-profit that helps to outfit a new home with furniture and housewares. If you would like to contribute to a designated fund to support these efforts, please make checks payable to Central Presbyterian Church and make sure to write in the memo line "refugee family." Checks can be left in the offering plate or mailed to the church office. The fund will be at the discretion of the Coordinated Mission Committee for the express purpose of supporting a new refugee family.

We also welcome Target gift cards for household purchases, and watch future bulletins and announcement for more specific needs.

How can I learn more and get involved?

Many people heard Melody Ward, the Refugee Program Specialist with Volunteer and Outreach at Minnesota Council of Churches, when she spoke at Central in January when there was great uncertainty due to the just-announced travel ban. Melody will be back at Central on Sunday, March 5 to speak in worship, and after worship she will provide an orientation to people who wish to volunteer.

What else can I do?

Please pray for our family as they prepare to depart and travel to Minnesota. That is often an emotionally difficult and physically grueling experience. Traveling with young children is often difficult—imagine the complexities they may encounter!

The mission of the Minnesota Coalition for the Homeless is to generate policies, community support and local resources for housing and services to end homelessness in Minnesota. They believe everyone deserves a safe, decent, affordable place to call home and that homelessness is preventable.

We achieve our mission and vision through advocacy, technical assistance, and building public awareness. The Coalition has been the voice for people experiencing homelessness and for service providers in state and federal policy decision-making since 1984.


