Congregation Votes to Approve New Pastor!

Rev. Christopher Chatelaine-Samsen said in his sermon, "We conduct perfectly ordinary work every day to make room for the extraordinary."

For over 150 years, Central has stood in service to the Greater Saint Paul community under the helm of many wonderful pastors. Each in their time led congregants, volunteers, leaders, and committees in perfectly ordinary work - serving the daily needs of faith ministry and ongoing needs of missions. So many years later, it is awe inspiring to realize how long this church has weathered time and change, therein reflecting something extraordinary.

A Vote of Approval

On February 26, the Central congregation voted to step into a new chapter of that historic legacy, welcoming Rev. Christopher Chatelaine-Samsen as its next called pastor in a unanimous vote of approval. With 65 affirmative adult



member votes and 9 affirmative youth votes, the response was clear - the Pastor Nominating Committee had heard the voices of the congregation calling out their needs and desires and identified a candidate who would successfully fit the diverse needs of our church.

The congregation voted to not only accept Rev. Chatelaine-Samsen as our pastor, but also approved his terms of call. As he was informed of the voting tally before announcement to the congregation, he too was offered the opportunity to accept the call and did so with his daughter Junie by his side. It was indeed an exciting day in worship to see two years of searching coming to an end, inviting us to now return our focus to the daily work and intentional growth of the church.

Starting Date

Rev. Chatelaine-Samsen, or *Chris* as he has invited us to call him, will begin working at Central on April 1 with Palm Sunday (April 2) marking his first regular worship service. There will be a period of adjustment and the business of stepping into new work at Central, so his formal installation will take place at a later

The Season of Lent Begins with Water and Spirit

Gregg and I are grateful to be journeying through this season of Lent with you, with a theme *Water and Spirit*.

It is our hope that focusing our attention on water and the Holy Spirit in this special season here at Central will deepen our faith and encourage our participation as every day we see the cross and the empty tomb approaching.

Water has power. It is life-giving. Life as we know it cannot continue without water. It can also be life-taking.

I grew up in Johnstown PA, where my dad was the pastor of the First Presbyterian Church. Johnstown is called "The Flood City" because of three major floods that devastated the downtown at the junction of Stony Creek and the Little Conemaugh River. The great flood of 1889 is the most famous. Andrew Mellon, Andrew Carnegie, and other Pittsburgh industrial barons had built the largest earthen dam known at that time to create a reservoir for their hunting and fishing lodge. Over years they neglected repairs of the dam. One day in May after heavy spring rains, the dam broke, releasing a wall of water into the unsuspecting heart of the city of Johnstown. The loss of life and devastation were tremendous.

Water is essential for life in our homes, for drinking, cooking, bathing, and cleaning. We are



accustomed to turning the tap and enjoying pure, clean, hot and cold water. But, the water flowing through our urban water systems can destroy life if it is not treated properly. The people of Flint, Michigan and Jackson, Mississippi found that their drinking water was poisoning them, especially their

children, because of decaying lead pipes. It seemed unimaginable that this could happen in our country, but it turned out to be one of the most heart-breaking recent manifestations of racism.

In John 4, we find the story of Jesus encountering a nameless Samaritan woman at the village well. He says to her, "Those who drink the water I give will never be thirsty. The water will become in them a spring gushing up to eternal life." When he met her, Jesus cut through injustice in her life from differences of gender, class, race, and social status. He does the same for us today.

The power of ordinary water can be positive or negative, but water as a sign of the Holy Spirit is all about blessing among people of faith, especially in the sacrament of baptism.

Through these next weeks of Lent, we will seek to discover the interplay of water and God's Spirit, to satisfy our thirst and cleanse us from sin.

While Adam and Leah Van der Sluis are enjoying the first weeks of the arrival of baby James, we are thrilled to welcome Matthew Valverde to our choir as Tenor Section Leader.

Matthew has been praised for his sensitive phrasing, “mellifluous” singing, and “handsome” tenor voice (Star Tribune, New York Classical Review). He was awarded a D.M.A. degree and an M.M. degree in vocal performance and literature from the Eastman School of Music (Rochester, NY) and holds degrees from Texas Christian University (Fort Worth, TX). Valverde is Associate Professor of Music at Adams State University in Alamosa, CO, where he also serves as Project Director for a U.S. Department of Education Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions Title V Grant.

Matthew has performed solo recitals and has been featured in concerts and operas in New York, Virginia, Minnesota, Michigan, Colorado, Indiana, New Mexico, and Texas. He



made his Carnegie Hall debut in May 2014 and has been tenor soloist in performances including Handel’s *Messiah*, Haydn’s *The Creation*, Mendelssohn’s *Elijah*, Góljov’s *La Pasión Según San Marcos*, Mozart’s *Requiem*, and Britten’s *Serenade and War Requiem*. Orchestral credits include: Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra,

Minnesota Orchestra, Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, National Repertory Orchestra, Rochester Chamber Orchestra, Rochester Oratorio Society, Finger Lakes Choral Festival, and the San Luis Valley Symphony.

Matthew has appeared with the Rochester Lyric Opera, Finger Lakes Opera (Geneseo, NY), John Duffy Institute for New Opera at Virginia Arts Festival, Eastman Opera Theatre, and TCU Opera Studio; he sang in the premiere performances of *Tienda* (Moya/Vincent) in the Twin Cities. He has performed with the Internationale Bachakademie’s Festivalensemble Stuttgart (Helmuth Rilling), Vox Humana (David Childs), Voices Chamber Choir (William Weinert), Border CrosSing (Ahmed Anzaldúa), and is the tenor section leader of EXIGENCE Vocal Ensemble (Eugene Rogers). He can be heard as tenor soloist with Border CrosSing on their debut album *Un Milagro de Fe* (“A Miracle of Faith”) released on Bridge Records.

Thank You from VocalPoint

After 12 years at Central, VocalPoint is coming to an end. The concerts in February were a wonderful success with \$34,466.06 raised!

I'd like to share the words that I offered at the concerts here with you – the Central community – because you have been such an integral part of our growing, nurturing, and thriving. Without this beautiful space, your gracious hospitality, and the volunteer hours from so many of you, we couldn't have done this work. Thank you for opening wide your doors to this project and inviting in so many people to experience our unique choir.

When I was a teenager, my parents bought a small piece of land up in the north woods of Minnesota. It's on a modest little lake that you've probably never heard of, nestled next to Superior National Forest land.

The first spring, my parents purchased 500 little seedlings from the forest service – white pine, Norway pine and black spruce. Then they informed me that I would be joining them and my grandparents to plant these 6" delicate little seedlings all over the jungle of our land. It was a cold, wet spring day that we started our work. Clear a little spot of ground, dig a small hole, plant the seedling, and then, tie a small blaze orange ribbon around it to identify it and help us avoid stepping on it. We

did this 500 times.

This was not prime growing conditions, as you might imagine. Between the moose and the deer, the bitter cold, the lack of consistent watering, and the forest growth that prevents sunlight hitting the little trees, there was lots that might stand in the way of a successful future. And even then, they would grow slowly. Make no mistake, this was a labor of love and faith.

I can only imagine how charming I was that day as a 15 year old. I remember thinking *why bother?* These will take FOREVER to grow, even if they survive at all. Would I, much less my parents, even see the results of this work? But I can assure you, the lesson did sink in:

Invest in what matters. Take the long view, and know that in order to have beautiful trees in the future, we must plant seeds today.

I've gotten to listen to the staff at Urban Roots, and they know this truth. They are investing in what matters each time they hire a new youth intern and begin the training about food justice and conservation projects and how to nurture a tiny seed so that it grows and thrives. Sometimes it's about gardening. Always it's about people.

VocalPoint singers and I have had the opportunity to sit around the

huge dining table at the Urban Roots location on Payne Avenue on the East Side of Saint Paul and we've shared a meal together – served generously and abundantly and ending with the most amazing pistachio-cardamom cupcakes. Sometimes it's about eating. Always it's about sharing.

We've heard from the young people who are learning and being nurtured by Urban Roots in our videos today – they've told us about buckthorn and treasures in the form of root veggies, and working alongside chefs and getting outside of the city to enjoy this beautiful state. Sometimes it's about employment. Always it's about hope for something better.

I would like to think that starting 19 years ago we did a little investing of our own – in communities in Southeast Asia recovering from the devastating Tsunami, in a school that lives its mission of peace, in advocating for human rights, in celebrating all who call Minnesota home, and in resourcing a garage on Lake Street. And so much more.

As this season comes to a close for me and for this project that we've done together, people have been asking what has been the highlight of this work. It's been that I've been inspired over and over again. By the headliners who knock our socks off and each one, check off a bucket list item for me. By the non-profits who are doing the work day in and day out, without fanfare and with limited

resources. By the people who have trusted us with their stories – that we would tell them well, with respect and honesty. I've been inspired by your incredible generosity as you've invested in our work – over \$384,000 in total; over \$40,000 last year alone. Incredible. And I've been inspired by these singers who year after year have offered their time, talent, energy, and their dear friendship to me and to each other. Sometimes it's about a concert. Always it's about community.

At these concerts, we ask you to be generous - to plant some seeds with us even though we may not see the specific results. We may not eat a tomato from an Urban Roots garden (although if you visit a Farmers market in St. Paul this summer, you very well may). We may not cross paths with one of the youth interns hired by Urban Roots (although, if you're ever in the position to hire someone who isn't afraid of hard work, you would be lucky if one of those interns applied.)

But I can tell you that there are some beautiful, healthy evergreen trees up on a modest lake in Northern Minnesota that can tell us about labors of love and of faith.

And I can tell you that this conductor knows this truth as well.

And, I thank you.

FROM THE FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP SUB-COMMITTEE ON CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

The Work Continues

As the weather warms, you will see restoration activity resuming full tilt outside on our historic building.

This work has been paid in part by the Minnesota Historical Society - thanks to the hard work and dedication of Fluryanne Leach who has persevered in obtaining several grants. This multi-year restoration includes three sides of our building still to be done.

These grants require matching funds from Central, which must come from outside annual budget. To better understand this, we encourage you to read the financial reports in our newly issued 2022 Annual Report.

What Lies Ahead

In 2022, Session approved a 5-year plan to keep Central on a positive footing financially. This plan requires us to determine if and when a capital campaign should be undertaken to complete our building restoration.

To assist in this process, Central has engaged Partners for Sacred Places to conduct a feasibility study which will measure the viability of a capital campaign to fund the restoration work, including clarifying Central's fundraising potential and possible sources beyond the congregation.

The study will use individual interviews and independent research to analyze the current state of Central Presbyterian Church and its impact

on the life of greater Saint Paul, providing insight into how residents feel about the church and its work in the community. Interviews will include community partners, such as Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative and Interfaith Action of Greater St. Paul, members of the congregation, and those engaged with the missions and activities of Central. We hope you will participate in an interview if asked.

The resulting feasibility study report from Partners for Sacred Places will provide a roadmap for moving forward with a community-wide capital campaign.

A Capital Campaign

In the coming weeks and months, we will share continued updates from our work with Partners for Sacred Places, including the scope of construction to be addressed by a

capital campaign, as well as the results of the feasibility study, and the strategies recommended to raise funds beyond membership giving.

We are not initiating a capital campaign at this time, but positioning ourselves to do so in the upcoming program year. We will continue to share information on this process as we are able and will answer questions as we are able along the way.

Central Presbyterian Church is so much more than an aging church structure needing renovation. It is a place from which God's work and missions take place.

Having stood for over a century, our building's care is a blessing for not only this time, but years to come as the legacy of this beautiful space continues to serve and our mission remains to be *in the city for good!*
