beginning with the 2000 Blossom Festival season. Prior to joining the Orchestra, she served as associate concertmaster of the Canton Symphony Orchestra. She earned bachelor and master of music degrees from the Cleveland Institute of Music (CIM), where she studied with Cleveland Orchestra concertmaster William Preucil, David Updegraff, and Linda Cerone. At CIM, Sonja was a recipient of the Jerome Gross Prize in Violin, was named Theodore Presser Scholar, and was co-recipient of the Bennett Levine Memorial Award in Chamber Music.

Sonja has participated in the Aspen Music Festival and the Sarasota Music Festival, and served as coconcertmaster of the National Repertory Orchestra in Colorado. She was a featured collaborator in the Austin Chamber Music Center's 2007-08 season and frequently performs in San Diego's Mainly Mozart festival as both a chamber and orchestral musician. Raised in Twin Cities, Minnesota, Sonja resides in Cleveland Heights.

Several Sundays ago, we talked about how the word "blessed" as shared in the Beatitudes, means being certain of God's love and made for holy work. So "blessed are the poor in spirit" means that when you're "down in the dumps" (one of the kids' paraphrase) you are (and can still be) certain of God's love and God's purpose for you. You are made for holy work.

We generally think of "blessed" as abundance and things going well. But, in the Beatitudes, Jesus shares that we can be certain of God's love and are doing holy work in the beautiful, often messy, hard times of life. For example, when we are down, grieving, longing for justice, showing mercy, or standing in the tense middle ground as peacemakers. In these hard experiences, we are blessed and can be certain of God's love and made for this holy work.

A Year of Housing Advocacy with Beacon

2023 marked a very busy year of housing advocacy for Central in its alliance with the Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative. While a brief overview was included in the annual report, it is helpful to see the details of a busy timeline in this publication as we head into the Homeless Day on the Hill event and other housing advocacy work over the coming year.

FEBRUARY 7

The House committee hearing for Bring It Home HF11* took place with 100 Beacon allies. This legislation sought to provide rental assistance for all low-income residents.

MARCH 5 & 7

Central conducted a postcard signing campaign thanking Minnesota House Speaker & Senate Majority Leader's support of HF11/SF11.

MARCH 7 & 28

Attendees received updates on the Gladstone Crossing housing development, including timelines for land use and funding work.

MARCH 20

Bring It Home, Minnesota day at the Capitol including rally and visits with legislators. Housing achieved a high target, \$1 billion for the two-year budget cycle. However, legislators allocated only the part of the surplus that is one-time dollars, meaning it is not projected to be there in the next budget cycle. While the \$1 billion budget is historic, we cannot create Bring it Home,

Minnesota rental assistance off of one-time dollars. Rental assistance needs ongoing resources to provide rental vouchers for as long as people need them and cannot be funded with this budget. The housing chairs are fighting to create a new metro sales tax to create dedicated funds for Bring it Home. Minnesota. The current proposal would be for a one-quarter-of-apercent sales tax with all revenue going to support affordable housing, and 25% of the revenue dedicated to Bring it Home, Minnesota rent vouchers statewide. It's estimated this could bring in \$300 million a year, enough to start making a real difference.

But because of our campaign:

The housing budget received its



- historic increase and has more than doubled since we launched three years ago.
- The Chairs of the Housing committees see rental assistance as their top priority and are still fighting – and need our help!
- The lack of rental assistance is now a major issue the media is tracking and writing multiple stories on this year.

This session does not point to what we did wrong, but to all we are doing right. We just need to do it on a much larger scale. We have built tremendous power, so much that we believed we might win this year, but it wasn't enough. We need to build more power. Although this is frustrating news to hear, we're not giving up.

APRIL 4

Joined with the Anti-Racism Task Force in "Taking Heart Iftar" dinners, which brings Muslims and non-Muslims together for food and conversation.

MAY 10

The Housing Omnibus bill has passed both the House and Senate and awaits the Governor's signature to become law.

In the bill, we celebrate:

 We established the first step of Bring it Home, Minnesota, with all ongoing resources! It will create nearly 5,500 new rent support vouchers using the funds from a new Metro Sales Tax and ongoing appropriations.

- \$200 million in capital dollars to build new affordable housing in the state.
- \$25 million for a new "strengthen supportive housing program" that will fill currently unfunded but necessary elements to supportive housing like front desk and security personnel.

Thanks to the support and advocacy efforts of Beacon member churches, the Minnesota Senate and House has approved ongoing funding for the first-ever general rental assistance vouchers program in the state:

Bring It Home, Minnesota!

- \$65 to 73 million in yearly funding for rental assistance youchers between 2024 - 2027.
- 5.5 thousand additional rental assistance vouchers available between 2024 - 2027.

So, for the lowest earning households in Minnesota, vouchers ensure they won't pay over 30% monthly income on rent.

Unlocking the Metro project-based vouchers and our advocacy to the Met Council:

JUNE 11

Central's Beacon members invited Central members to the Dining Room



after worship on June 11 to write messages to the members of the Metropolitan Council and attach them to the keys we've collected. The Beacon congregational organizer for Central, Justin Lewandowski, shared information about the need for deeply affordable housing, especially in the suburbs, and the importance of the Met Council making project-based rent vouchers more accessible to developers.

Everyone's tagged keys were combined with those from other Beacon congregations and presented to the Metropolitan Council by the Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative.

JUNE 14

About 40 people marched from Central Presbyterian Church to the Met Council in downtown St. Paul to bring attention to the affordable housing crisis in the suburbs. More than 1,000 "Unlock the Met" keys were presented to the Council.

SEPTEMBER 18

Forty-nine Beacon members gathered at the Met Council, who

agreed to one substantial change. When they give project-based vouchers to developments, the developer can hold those vouchers for two years while the development is trying to secure funding. This is a great win, as before we lost vouchers after one year. Due to the limited funds for affordable housing compared to the demand, developments often get funded in their second year of applying for funding awards.

All Met Council members are excited about the new Bring it Home state vouchers and want to consider how to project base them. There is a significant opportunity to return when these vouchers are available.

Because of our excellent work this year, we can get new project-based vouchers.

ADULT FAITH FORMATION

MARCH TOPIC: GENDER EQUALITY

In the story of the Christian church, it is only in very recent years that women have been included in the full life of the ministry of the church, much less people who don't identify within a gender binary. And even now, only a small fraction of the global church includes women in ministry.

And while the Bible is uneven on its view of women throughout Scripture, there are texts that affirm, especially through Jesus' ministry, a radical inclusion that

was deeply countercultural for its time.

And how do lessons from the long and continuing work of gender inclusion speak to the other barriers inside and outside the church that still need to come down?
