SUNDAY WORSHIP 10:30 AM

Fifty years ago last month, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated in Memphis. He was there to support a group of striking sanitation workers. Some had been holding signs saying, "I am a man." In a society that saw color first, and class second, this strike was an attempt not only to gain bargaining advantages, but to assert human dignity in the face of great injustice. And it was there in Memphis, on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel, that Dr. King was gunned down in what would become a terribly violent year in American history.

At the time of his death, he was both unpopular and feared. The ensuing decades have proven that his goals were honorable and his ministry helpful in having our country live up to its declared ideals. I am not sure if anything but faith can render a verdict on whether his overarching principal of non-violent resistance was the most effective in overcoming injustice and ancient prejudice.

King was killed just ten days before Easter that year. Presbyterian hymn writer Brian Wren put pen to paper and wrote a hymn that was intended to express Easter hope while mindful of that terrible event. It became *Christ Is Alive!* one of our favorite Easter hymns at Central. We sang it on Easter Sunday, and we were going to feature it during worship on the snowed-out Sunday, April 15. So you will have to imagine the brass accompaniment as you read. During times that test our resolve, may we find and affirm the presence of a wounded, risen Christ.

Christ is alive! Let Christians sing.
The cross stands empty to the sky.
Let streets and homes with praises ring.
Love, drowned in death, shall never die.

Christ is alive! No longer bound to distant years in Palestine, but saving, healing, here and now, and touching every place and time.

In every insult, rift, and war where color, scorn, or wealth divide, Christ suffers still, yet loves the more, and lives, where even hope has died.

SUNDAY, MAY 6

The Letter to the Ephesians has a beautiful opening. Writing to the new church in Ephesus, the letter says, "I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power" (1:17-19).

Some say that we continue to live in a Good Friday world with an Easter faith. How do we see with the eyes of our heart enlightened? How do we tap into the greatness of God's power? Rev. Colby will preach, Central Choir sings and we will celebrate communion.

SUNDAY, MAY 13

Where do you sit to pray, find inspiration, gain clarity, warmth? The prophet Micah writes an eloquent passage about peace, and people streaming toward house. As God judges the nations, the prophet gives a vision of people "beating their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks," and then goes on to say "they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees, and no one shall make them afraid; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken" (Micah 4:1-5). Rev. Colby will preach. Guest composer and conductor, Jake Runestad joins worship.

PENTECOST SUNDAY, MAY 20

Rev. Colby will preach in worship as we celebrate the birth of the church and the story of Pentecost. Special music, celebrating Pentecost on this final Sunday of the program year. Our Central Choir will sing, as will the Sunday School Singers, and we will also feature Mark Doerr on the Hurdy Gurdy.

During worship, we will be honoring the teachers who help with Sunday School and Bible Study.

SUNDAY, MAY 27

Memory is an important part of our Christian faith. We remember and are filled with the life-giving power of the Holy Spirit. We remember the stories and acts of Jesus, and they inspire our and inform our own living. On this Memorial Day weekend, we know that this is not only the unofficial start to the summer season, but a time when memory shapes and inspires our life together. Central choir sings.

Welcome Guest Conductor, Jake Runestad

On May 13, Jake Runestad will be joining Central worship as a guest composer and conductor. Jake is an award-winning and frequently-performed composer of "highly imaginative" (Baltimore Sun) and "stirring and uplifting" (Miami Herald) musical works.

He has received commissions and performances from leading ensembles and organizations such as Washington National Opera, the Netherlands Radio Choir, the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, the Santa Fe Desert Chorale, Seraphic Fire, the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra, the Philippine Madrigal Singers, Craig Hella Johnson and Conspirare, and many more.

Jake's visceral music and charismatic personality have fostered a busy schedule of commissions, residencies, workshops, and speaking engagements, enabling him to be one of the youngest full-time composers in the world. Jake holds a Master's degree in composition from the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University where he studied with Pulitzer Prize-winning composer Kevin Puts. He has also studied extensively with acclaimed composer Libby Larsen.

A native of Rockford, IL, Jake is currently based in Minneapolis, MN and his music is published by JR Music.

Session Discernment Process Continues

In early 2018, the Session announced that Central had received a large gift of \$1.65 million dollars. A gift of this magnitude provides the opportunity to do powerful ministry and to enhance and enlarge the reach of our service to God. At the time we announced this gift, we said that how we make decisions might matter as much as what decisions are made about how to use this gift. So we have been careful, thoughtful, prayerful, and, we hope and trust, faithful to God in our deliberations.

Good decision-making should spring from core values. As the 2018 Session was getting oriented to their work and meeting one another, we began by exploring and articulating key aspects of Central's identity. What are the values that shape our ministry? What does this congregation care about most? What do we hold in common with other churches? What makes us unique? Who are we as a church?

Building upon those core values, the Session then began to think about goals over the next five to ten years. We were guided by questions such as: Who do we want to become? Why do we want to exist? And how should we be different in our new financial condition?

Five goals began to gain support and consensus among the Session.

- 1. Grow the number of people involved in the life of this church.
- 2. Provide more benefits to the community (including through partnerships with other organizations).
- 3. Maintain the church facility.
- 4. Expand member participation.
- 5. And be intentional in our efforts to increase the racial diversity of this congregation.

In March, the Session solicited input from the congregation, inviting members and friends to complete two sentences.

- As the Session discerns how best to use this gift, please consider . . .
- I hope that Central . . .

We received many responses to this input. Some of the comments mesh well with what committees have been exploring. Other comments suggested unique ideas. Others offered encouragement or reminders about values shared by the congregation. The Session is grateful for the input and for the trust which the congregation has placed in us. We welcome your prayers as we continue to explore possibilities and move toward some decisions about how best to use this gift.

This is an exciting time at Central! We will continue to share updates about our process and plans as they develop. If you have questions, ideas or concerns, please talk to any session member or contact either of the two of us.

Central Launches Food Initiative

Meals are important at Central. Our Wednesday Community Lunch and 3rd Sunday lunches are highlights for the quality of food, the variety in our menus, the interaction between staff (Chef Barb and Sous Chef Sue) and volunteers, and our desire to offer food to all who are hungry, regardless of ability to pay. In January, Central received a gift to enable us to build on our strengths and location and do even more to offer food to those who are hungry.

We knew immediately that we want to be able to have convenient food on hand so that if anyone says they are hungry, we can offer them something that is nutritious and filling. So we have created a small pantry of items including soup, protein bars, crackers and cheese, applesauce, and often pieces of fresh fruit. We continue to support the nearby Neighborhood House Food Shelf, where people can get food and be connected to critical community resources. The Neighborhood House Food Shelf is great in encouraging food donations that are familiar to people who are served.

To do more, and to be effective and helpful, we realized that we needed to learn about hunger in downtown, and what other resources exist near us. So we have commissioned research being done this semester by three Macalester College students. From their academic angles of sociology and urban geography, they are helping to map out what resources exist and making initial contacts with organizations already working to address hunger.

One of the students, Sarah Hoffman, applied for and has received a grant that will enable her to work with us full-time this summer. Sarah will be helping to set up hands-on opportunities to volunteer with, and learn from, other organizations working on food ministries.

Originally from New York, Sarah is a rising senior at Macalester College, where she is pursuing an international studies major with a focus in political science. She plays the violin and enjoys music, as well as hiking and kayaking. Sarah is currently conducting food security research and interviewing organizations involved in the provision of food in downtown Saint Paul. She is looking forward to putting into operation this research with her hunger initiative internship at Central, and can't wait to learn more about cooking when she volunteers at the Wednesday community lunches.

Now we are ready to solicit feedback and volunteers. We are looking to create a task force of interested Central members and friends to work with Sarah beginning later this month and throughout the summer. Please send Rev. 

average child easily uses 2000+ diapers from birth until toilet training and yet diapers are not covered by food stamps, WIC, Medicaid or any special nutrition benefit package. Cloth is not possible to use if you lack resources to clean the diapers regularly. The richest Americans can use bulk buying and easy mobility to get deals on diapers; the poorest Americans use up to 14% of their budget to keep their children clean.

For two weeks in June, Central is collecting diapers of all sizes, especially larger ones. We will be donating them to families in need to help close the gap. Please bring diapers to church on June 10 or 17 and place them in the donation box. All brands are welcome. Thank you!
