UNDERSTANDING INSTALLATION

"In installation, the church sets apart with prayer those previously ordained as deacons, ruling elders, and teaching elders, and called anew to service in that ministry." (The Directory for Worship of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A.). Installation services are celebrations for the community that calls a new pastor, and the culmination of work completed by the congregation, the presbytery and the minister. May 19th will be a day to celebrate how God has been at work in this call process in the past, even as we anticipate how God might lead us together into the future.

This installation service will celebrate the culmination of a lot of hard work on the part of Central


FAMILY GAME NIGHT - JUNE 1

NEW HYMN TO PREMIER ON MAY 19

After new branding, led by Christie Rachelle and the New Members and Volunteer Committee (as well as the staff and Session at large), was created, including the beautiful logo seen below, we knew we wanted to highlight the art with a new hymn.



When Abbie Betinis took the role of composer-in-residence, it was an obvious fit. On May 19, the day that we celebrate being called into ministry – as a church, and specifically Rev. Ashley Bair's call to ministry here at Central, it seemed like a great day to premiere the hymn using the following inspiration that takes shape in our logo:

- Inspiration is taken from the balcony view of people seated throughout the curved sanctuary of Central on Sundays.
- Subtle, but important, theological images can be found within this design, be it the splash of water at baptism, a crown of thorns, or the dancing flames of the Holy Spirit.
- Shapes represent diversity persons from differing backgrounds, ethnicities, cultures and strengths coming together around a common purpose.
- In pursuit of social justice, elements move out from the core - showing Central's efforts to put faith into action by engaging others and drive change in our broader community.
- The focal point of the logo is the core, reflective of our emphasis and focus first inward on the word of God

- Design is open and airy with an almost fluid movement and flow, much like the art of music for which Central is so revered.
- Elements move inward to reflect the idea of people 'coming to the table', representative of our food initiatives where all are welcome.
- Aesthetic is inspired by the shape of our prominent stained glass windows.
- Icon is reflective of the sanctuary, an auditorium designed to amplify the spoken word.
- A clean, contemporary style was chosen to reflect changing design trends, the prominence of digital marketing and the influence of younger demo-graphics.

Q & A WITH OUR COMPOSER-IN-RESIDENCE

Later this month, Central will be premiering a new hymn. We are not sure if this is a first for this congregation or not, but it certainly is a unique opportunity worth celebrating. Jennifer Anderson asked Abbie if she would share some things with us about her as a composer, and she graciously agreed. Make sure to attend worship on May 19th to be a part of the singing community that premieres the new hymn!

What do you love most about being a Composer?

I love so many parts about composing. I feel like I'm a professional dreamer. I also really love the business of being self-employed. I get to create my own hours and vacations (though I'm not very good at taking vacations), follow my heart for projects that I love to do, and keep challenging myself to learn something new with every project. My brain feels good when I write music. And – if I'm doing it right – my soul feels good too.

In 100 years, what 3 choral works (other than your own) written thus far in the 21st century do you think choirs will still be performing and why?

- Path of Miracles (Joby Talbot, 2005)
- The Little Match Girl Passion (David Lang, 2008)
- The Deer's Cry (Arvo P\u00e4rt, 2008)

I think great storytelling never goes out of style. These pieces invite us on a journey and hold us all the way through, while also leaving a lot of space — silence even — for the listener to imagine.

What is the hardest part about being a composer?

There are a lot of hard things and every day it is something else. Getting motivated, keeping doubt out of the creative process, project management. A lot of my days are spent answering emails about my work, mostly from conductors or some like this from students, and filling orders for my music. It is hard for me to get to the piano to practice and to write.

Right now I'm trying to work through a lot of fear for some reason - fear of trying something new in art, and wondering if I can do it. I've spent a lot of time recently trying to work myself up to writing (like quite literally saying to myself in the mirror "C'mon Abbie! You can totally do this!" "No one else


can do this but you!" "You have things to say!"), and in trying to trust the music that comes out.

And now that people know my music around the world, there's even more pressure to try to do a really good job with every single project, and it's hard to guarantee that it's going to be perfect when I don't know how the music goes yet, especially when I'm trying to stretch myself and make each composition different from the last one.

Who are your favorite composers and how have they influenced your pieces?

Some of my favorite composers are Johannes Brahms, Giovanni Palestrina, Francis Poulenc and Igor Stravinsky. They've all influenced my music in different ways. Some for counterpoint, some for harmony, some for the element of surprise, others for rhythm and texture.

particular, how they would work as a team with Rev. Colby.

WORKING WITH THE PRESBYTERY

This installation service is not just about Central and our work; it is also a celebration for the presbytery and a time for us to show our gratitude for time and leadership invested in our search process by the presbytery. In our process, we had reason to have a great deal of trust in the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area and specifically the leadership of Executive Presbyter Jeff Japinga, and so we took a less traditional route of seeking a designated Associate Pastor. And so we are grateful for the involvement of a team from presbytery that really listened to us about what we wanted this Associate Pastor to do and what skills and interests we thought would be most important and tried to describe the qualities and competencies and curiosities of a successful candidate. This team pre-screened all applicants, and Executive Presbyter Jeff Japinga did a first round of reference calls on this initial pool of We are incredibly candidates. grateful to this task force, ably lead by the Rev. Denise Dunbar-Perkins that included the Rev. Paul Moore of Chain of Lakes Church and Ken Huskins of Westminster Presbyterian in Minneapolis.

NARROWING CANDIDATES

After the presbytery's task force sent a pool of candidates to our pastor nominating committee, the presbytery continued to play a supportive role. The DAPNC (Designated Associate Pastor Nominating Committee) had a great experience worshipping at Grace-Trinity Community Church and remains thankful for their hospitality and opening their pulpit for candidating sermons in a neutral (but friendly and supportive) pulpit. The call process then relies upon the wisdom and guidance and eventually approval from the Committee on Ministry and the presbytery as a whole. installation service for a pastor is both an act of the entire presbytery and a celebration of who we are as denomination and partnerships that are already present and might be strengthened in the future.

REV. BAIR'S PATH TO CENTRAL

Finally, this installation service will be a culmination of the seminary training and career development of Ashley herself. A chance to think about the early stages of her faith development. An opportunity for her family to come and experience Central and share in the joy. An opportunity for Central to hear a message about the gospel and how that connects to Ashley's path and skills from someone who has been a trusted colleague and friend.

How has choral composition changed in the last 20 years? How will it in the next 20?

Twenty years ago, I cried hearing Water Night. It was the first time I had experienced harmony being released from harmonic function. Now I get emotional hearing Ted Hearne's Privilege (2009) and Caroline Shaw's Partita for 8 Voices (2012). It is so exciting to hear texture having emerged as a primary storytelling device. In the next 20 years, I expect the roles of texture and timbre to expand, and a more complete vocabulary for those important musical elements to become standard.

What are the biggest challenges facing choral composers today?

Climate change, nuclear war, gun violence, voting rights, mass incarceration, and finding the courage. . .

What advice would you give a student who wants to major in composition?

Don't worry too much about being unique, you already are. And if you think your music isn't unique enough, or resonating with people, change yourself - travel, ask questions, go to the theater - don't change the music to be something you aren't. Honest storytelling and vulnerability are assets in a composer. But do practice the craft all the time, so you can most fluently be yourself.

SUYAO TIAN ARTIST EXHIBIT

The paintings of Suyao Tian are now on exhibit in the Friendship Room. Suyao Tian, born in China, came to the U.S. seven years ago to pursue her dream to be an artist. She is a professional artist and designer who holds an MFA degree from the Minneapolis College of Art and Design.

Her paintings, in water color, are her creation of the fantasy world she lives in her mind. The ideas come from her childhood, dreams, and subconscious imagination. She uses abstraction to catch a moment, feeling, and unclear form when they appear in her mind. To learn more about this artist and see more of her work (including the creation


