



A NEW MARK IN CENTRAL'S HISTORY A Reflection from Rev. David Colby

I have found myself saying that some of the best moments in our religious history came about when the use of a new technology became available during a time of challenging circumstances. Back in the 1500s, the invention of the printing press and the continued threat of the plague helped Martin Luther and John Calvin and others participate in a Reformation movement that changed the church. I think that we may be living in a time that is enabling the church to connect with others and tell stories of faith in new ways during this

global pandemic. So we are worshipping online and groups are connecting over Zoom, and setting up times to meet safely face to face in backyards and parking lots. I think it is pretty exciting to see how rapidly we are changing and adapting to do ministry together during this time in which we find ourselves living.

By the time you will be reading this, assuming a quorum was present, Central Presbyterian Church will have experienced its first online

UPCOMING WORSHIP

Throughout October we will continue to explore stories of faith from the Bible about how time is marked and remembered and celebrated. How difficult things are endured together. We will be looking at stories of long periods of epic struggles told in the Bible. Forty days and nights of rain and Noah and the ark and eventually a new beginning. Forty years of wandering in the wilderness, trying and trying to get to the Promised Land. Forty days of being taunted by a bully, only to have an unlikely leader step forward. Forty days and nights of wandering in the wilderness. There's a recurring number in those stories. 40. It's more than a scientific measurement and is used in the Bible to represent a long time. During this unusual time we find ourselves in, we will be looking at these stories and looking for wisdom and insight and using our faithful imaginations.

Sunday, October 4

We will join the band of Israelites wandering in the wilderness. Those first heady days after escaping slavery are long behind them, and the promised land is still a long, long ways away. In the midst of what would become a 40 year period of wandering in the wilderness, we will look at the story about hunger, and how God provided manna from heaven (Exodus 16:1-21). Food enough for that day. And it was received with gratitude. This is World Communion Sunday, and worship will feature an invitation for us to participate in communion as we are connected to global images. And we

will promote participation in the denomination's Peace and Global Witness special offering (page 6).

Sunday, October 11

We will continue to wander in the wilderness with the Israelites. So often on a long journey there is that day when people start getting cranky! We will look at Exodus 17:1-7 and imagine this journey taking place not just on a geographical map, but as a rollercoaster of emotions as well.

Sunday, October 18

As the Promised Land draws closer, a realization dawns that not everyone will make it there alive. A transition of leadership from Moses to Joshua will occur shortly, but we will look at Deuteronomy 34:1-9 and can almost imagine ourselves being present with Moses as he is allowed to look over into the Promised Land, even as he knows that he will not get to enter it.

Sunday, October 25

Continuing our examination into stories of long periods, we will jump to a story in the seventeenth chapter of 1 Samuel. And in this story we hear of a bully coming out every single day for forty days to taunt the Israelites. It becomes the story of David and Goliath, but we begin by imagining how to endure day after day of taunts and threats of violence. Amidst those taunts and threats, how do we endure and live faithfully?



(Age groups will split after we gather and check in).


1:00 - 1:45 p.m.

WORK BEGINS ON FRONT OF CHURCH

The Facilities Management and Risk Assessment Committee is excited that work has begun on the first phase of a five-phase project to rehabilitate and preserve the exterior fabric of the church. This project began in 2018 with an assessment by a historic architect of the condition of the exterior of the church and recommendations for work needed to both repair and then preserve the masonry and stained-glass windows for the future. This was funded by a grant from the State of Minnesota from the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund through the Minnesota Historical Society. This year we were awarded another grant to help fund the work in this first phase.

The project started in late July with the large rectangular stained-glass windows in the main front doors. These were found to be in such poor condition that they were removed for restoration in the studios of Classic Glass Ltd in Fargo, North Dakota. This is the first time that the windows have been removed since they were installed in 1890. There are a number of areas where earlier repairs had been done with the windows in place. Several of the rondels (the small square panes that appear to have a 'blob' in the center) must have been broken and were replaced with various other pieces of glass. Before the windows were removed the workmen pointed out that the windows were not centered exactly in the opening space. When the windows were removed the reason for this became evident – the windows were originally

made about $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch too wide for the space! In order to install the windows a channel was cut into one side of the opening to accommodate the extra width. After restoration the windows will be centered exactly when they are re-installed. New protective coverings will also be installed so the glass will be visible from the outside and will allow more light into the narthex.

If you have passed the church recently you will have seen that the front is covered with scaffolding. Rehabilitation of the masonry will begin early in October. Almost half of the tuck pointing needs to be completely replaced and 40% of the rest needs repair. They will also repair cracked and spalled stones, replace stones that cannot be repaired, and replace sealant. In addition, the wood frames of several non-stained-glass windows will be repaired, and new storm windows installed. All this work is expected to be completed this fall.

The final portion of this phase is to replace the protective covering over the large stained glass window over the main doors and do any repairs needed to the outside frame of the window. There isn't time to complete this before winter and ensure that the stained glass will be protected from bad weather so this will be done in the spring. This work will be done by Classic Glass Ltd. who were also responsible for the restoration of the large, stained glass window on the south side facing MPR. They will also be replacing the protective covering of



the large, stained glass window over the main front doors with a new glass covering to match the window on the south side. This will allow the beauty of that window to be seen from the outside once again.

Because of the scaffolding and for safety reasons there will be no access to the church via the main front doors until the masonry work is completed and scaffolding is removed. The 500-entrance on Cedar Street will remain accessible throughout the work period.


