PUERTO RICO MISSION TRIP

GET INVOLVED

The situation in Puerto Rico has been developing, and the challenges facing people on the island continue to be daunting. Representatives from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance recently returned from a trip to Puerto Rico and now have two mission sites doing good work and taking reservations for mission trip groups.

As previously announced, Central is looking to send a mission team to assist in this rebuilding. We would be looking to go after the 2018 hurricane season concludes, likely in late October or November. While plans have been slow to develop, we expect to move fast over the next few weeks.

LOCATIONS

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance has two church sites that are doing good work and capable of hosting groups. For both sites, the work we would do is rebuilding homes that were uninsured or underinsured, requiring hard work with cement. But a mission specialist at PDA emphasized that there is a



range of tasks and some of the work group might go knowing that they won't do much of the hard labor, but might do things like landscaping, or meal service, or being a journalist about the trip.

If you would like to learn a bit about these two different locations, you might begin with looking where they are on a map. One is in the Monteflores neighborhood of San Juan (very close to the international airport) and the Old City. The other location is in Añasco on the west side of the island. Both of the sites have a presence on Facebook



A WORD FROM REV. COLBY

One of the questions I like to ask groups who come to Central for a tour is this: Why do you think this church is called Central? While they never get the answer exactly correct, they usually have good guesses. Is it because you are in the center of Saint Paul? Is it because it was the third church in the city, and you were between the other two? Thanks for playing. What do you think? Why are we called Central?

I want to say that we are called Central Presbyterian Church because here, we look at issues that are central to faith; we are not afraid to tackle the issues central to the news and to politics and to our city's life. I want us to be Central because we are in the center of the city, right "in the heart of the city" as an earlier tag line for this church put it.

Beginning on Rally Day, September 9, we will launch a series we are calling "Central 360." Taking stock in who we are and how we relate to things in all directions from the church. We will look at how the church relates to and influences our surroundings. Looking at topics like:

- Transportation, not only how we get to church but also where are we going as a church
- Food and meals within and around the church
- The arts and how the church reflects and inspires beauty and creativity
- The river and nature that anchors the city.

- How St. Paul is a hub for entertainment and culture and fun, and how our church life should emphasize that as well
- Whether we look up the hill to the north (the Capitol) or toward the river (City Hall) how does our faith compel us to be involved in **politics** that reflect and shape our community?
- The diversity of housing options surrounding the church, but also the problem of homelessness
- Our connection to media, including how do we understand what is going on in our world and how do we distinguish between what is good news and bad, true news and news that is misleading or flat out false?

Beginning within our sanctuary, we will look both backwards and forwards, inwards and outwards to do a three-hundred and sixty-degree look at faith and our world. I'm excited for the opportunities all around us as September approaches. Enjoy this newsletter, and I hope you find ways you might put your faith into action.



So, how exactly did Central get its name?

Back in 1852 when this church received its name, it was more like how baseball fields are named these days (after a financial sponsor, the Central Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia).



SEARCH FOR ASSOCIATE PASTOR CONTINUES

As we begin the exciting process of searching for an Associate Pastor, we will be working closely with the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area and using denominational resources and following its processes. In July, Central's Session submitted an official request to the presbytery's Committee on Ministry to open a Designated Associate Pastor position, and that request was approved. We have completed the Ministry Information Form, which will be available for potential candidates to see, and we will also use that form proactively to advertise our position and recruit outstanding candidates.

Here are three excerpts about the position and what we are looking for in candidates:

We are looking for someone who is smart, engaging, faithful, energetic, strategic, creative, and innovative. A person who will be tireless in trying new ways to enable Central to fulfill our larger vision. We have a strong staff in place already, so we are looking for someone who will be a good team-player and make a strong staff even better.

The Associate Pastor will devote approximately 50% of her/his time on general Pastoral leadership

Leading worship which includes preaching ~ 1.5 times/month, ministering to the congregation in the spheres of Christian Education (adult, youth and children), providing Pastoral care, working with church committees, working to develop, refine church and program vision and turning vision and mission into executable programs

Additionally, approximately 50% of her/his time will be devoted to providing primary staff leadership for outreach to Downtown and Lowertown St. Paul. This will require that the Associate Pastor possess an entrepreneurial spirit and an engaging personality and a high energy level. Tasks will include but not be limited to:

- Meeting residents both new and established
- Seeking new members
- Assisting new members to acclimate and integrate into the congregation

- Establishing a dynamic presence and identity in the community
- Developing community partnerships with (a) other churches (b) other organizations (Gospel Mission, United Way, Twin Cities R!SE, etc.) (c) the local business community

We decided to look for a Designated Associate Pastor because this new position is an opportunity to be nimble, robust and able to adapt to opportunities that present themselves. We have set aside six years of full funding for this position, but we will, as a whole church, continuously seek improvement and dynamic ways and means to better carry out our mission. The Associate Pastor position will evolve as the church evolves.

A GRATEFUL HEART

Dear Central Church, Session, Dave, and my staff colleagues:

I am so, so grateful to all of you for not only the gift of a 6-week sabbatical, but also for the incredibly warm and gracious "welcome back" party on July 22. The food and flowers, and the banner with all the heartfelt notes --- wow! It was all just incredible! I am grateful for the kind words spoken and hugs shared - I was already looking forward to coming back, but you certainly made it the best return possible! A sincere thank you to the Worship, Music, and Arts Committee as well as to Personnel for that beautiful celebration.

Many of you have asked what I did on my sabbatical! I actually stayed quite busy with a number of musical endeavors. I attended, and spoke at, the national Chorus America conference in Chicago. Our session was about Justice Choir, and I spoke about how Central has used the Justice Choir songbook in worship and as a way to welcome new people to our faith community. I also was in the recording studio for several different projects - one of them is Lumina's new CD, to be released this fall, that will be available for free to people in hospice and critical care. It was an honor to help with that important project! At the end of July, I co-directed the Synod School Choir at Beuna Vista University (a Presbyterian college!) in Storm Lake, Iowa, and learned a lot about Sabbath practices especially through the Taize community in France.

But I didn't just work – one highlight was seeing Hamilton in Chicago – AMAZING!!! Talk to me about it if you've seen it!!! I got to celebrate important life events with friends – birthdays and special occasions – and to visit with family from out-oftown even as we walked a more difficult road of grief after the sudden death of Lucy's brother Mark.

It was a treasured time away, and I am grateful. But I am also really ready to "get back at it" – and to welcome the choir back this fall for a new year of music and community.

WELCOME ABBIE BETINIS, CENTRAL'S NEW COMPOSER-IN-RESIDENCE

The Worship, Music, and Arts Committee, along with the Session and staff, is proud to announce that we have hired Abbie Betinis as our Composer-in-Residence for 2018 - 2019!

Abbie is one of America's most performed living composers. From Carnegie Hall to Disney Hall, grade school assemblies to wedding ceremonies, state prisons to capitol buildings, cathedrals to summer camps, her music is being performed somewhere in the world every day. Abbie has created new music for over sixty organizations.

A two-time McKnight Artist Fellow, Abbie has won awards from the American Composers Forum, ASCAP and the Minnesota Music Educators At age 31, she was Association. deemed one of the nation's top 100 Composers Under 40 by National Public Radio and New York's WQXR-FM. On Minnesota Public Radio, her annual premier of a fresh, new Christmas carol has become a beloved holiday tradition. Her early career as a cancer survivor finding her voice is profiled in the Upper Midwest Emmy award-winning documentary "Never Stop Singing."

Abbie has held Composer-in-Residence positions with the Rose Ensemble, New York State School Music Association, the Singers-Minnesota Choral Artists and Schubert Club. She is the Executive Director of Justice Choir and Adjunct Professor of Composition at Concordia University—St. Paul.

So, what does a Composer-in-Residence do? Abbie is particularly eager to:

- Write an original hymn based on our new branding.
- Create a new table grace, unique to Central, to sing together before our meals.
- Compose a new anthem for the choir.
- Facilitate creative music-making workshops with the children.
- Lead an Adult Education on the creative process.

- Advise or collaborate on songs and carols for the children's Christmas pageant.
- Lead community singing outside of worship, with some possible ideas:
 - grace together before meals

 - lullaby evening for Project
 Home families

MEET GUITARIST EVA BENEKE

Eva will be joining worship on Sunday, September 23. Born in Berlin, Germany, Eva Beneke began her studies at the Berlin University of

Arts with Prof. Martin Rennert. Her success there led her to study with Prof. Thomas Müller-Pering, one Germany's influential guitarists. Eva received a doctorate with honors from the University Southern o f California, Thornton School of Music where she studied with Scott Tennant, Pepe Romero and jazz-guitar legend Bruce Forman.

In addition to prizes at international guitar festivals in The Netherlands, Italy and the U.S., Eva Beneke is an internationally acclaimed soloist, chamber musician and published arranger. Her performances have been broadcast nationally and internationally on radio and



television, such as NPR's "Performance Today", KUSC and Minnesota Public Radio. Highlights of her career include appearances with the German Symphony

Orchestra under Kent Nagano, invitations to festivals in China, Peru, Germany, Luxembourg, Lithuania, the U.S. and Canada, and a

> performance with Carrie Underwood at the 2010 American Country Music Awards.

> Her 2012 album "In Dulci Jubilo - A Classical Guitar Christmas" is a duocollaboration with Grammy®-winning guitarist Scott Tennant (L.A.G.Q.). Her latest album "The Complete works for voice

and guitar by Fernando Sor" is a collaboration with mezzo-soprano Nerea Berraondo.

HUNGER INITIATIVE

This summer, we learned more about downtown Saint Paul and the hunger need in our area. Downtown residents are disproportionately young (25-34 years old), although seniors are a fast-growing group of food shelf users. There is significant income disparity in downtown St. Paul with pronounced higher or lower income brackets.

There is also a lack of affordable and healthy grocery access in the downtown area. There are supportiv resources, many of which utilize grocery 'rescue'. (Food deemed unsalable and thrown from area grocery stores is still good to eat and redistributed to those in need). The local Lunds & Byerlys is currently open to weekend grocery rescue, which is coordinated through the Second Harvest Heartland.

Mobile food programs particularly increase access to nutritious food downtown by helping those who experience barriers to accessing traditional brick-and-mortar food shelves because of transportation or mobility challenges. It can be difficult to carry groceries on the bus!

Our Hunger Task Force also learned about the importance of partnership and collaboration to hunger solutions. It is more efficient to support another organization that is already doing good work, rather than trying to "reinvent the wheel" with a competing program. We also saw the value of socialization and building personal connections with those seeking hunger solutions. Volunteering can be a great way to start building these connections, as it

helps bridge the gaps in understanding between people and strengthens the reach of available resources.

There are many ideas on the table for how we could use our Hunger Initiative funding, including:

- Supporting the iHELP Market Square free grocery distribution program to expand their grocery delivery service to Central Towers, our neighboring senior hi-rise.
- Hosting community meal events.
- Planning volunteer trips to local hunger relief organizations such as Keystone Community Services, Loaves and Fishes, and Higher Ground.
- Stocking our food pantry with affordable snack packs from the nonprofit MATTER, which we have already begun!
- Becoming an east metro satellite site for Open Arms of Minnesota which provides free meals for people with life threatening illnesses.

Finally, there are three large organizations we are considering supporting: Hunger Solutions Minnesota, Keystone Community Services, and/or Twin Cities Mobile Market.

 Hunger Solutions is working to support food distribution where demand for services far outpaces the capacity of the food shelves.

- Keystone Community Services runs the Foodmobile food shelf that serves downtown Saint Paul, and hopes to work on developing a second Foodmobile next year.
- Twin Cities Mobile Market is an affordable, mobile grocery store also working toward program expansion.

Discussions are still underway as to the best course of action for Central, but we expect to have decision announcements soon.




