# THE CALL TO SERVE

[ BY REV. ASHLEY BAIR ]

Before the feast of Passover, the last feast shared between Jesus and his friends, Jesus poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciple's feet (John 13). The disciples were unsure of why Jesus would do such a thing. Historically, dinner guests were invited into a home by a nameless servant who washed feet and hands before the meal. So, the disciples were confused. In fact, Peter even said to Jesus, "You will never wash my feet." Peter said this not as an insult or a demand, but rather as a question, embarrassed that Jesus would do something that was typically performed by a servant.

Jesus, however, continued and washed all of their feet, and said to

them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So, if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them. (John 13:12 -17)"

Jesus' service to the disciples was intentionally shaped as an act of love meant as an example to be followed. He showed the disciples

# SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 15

On the third Sundays of each month, such as Sept 15, all are invited to stay after worship for a Third Sunday Lunch. In doing this, we are very much following in the ways of Jesus, who used meals as an opportunity not just for people to be fed, but to be nourished and included. But the meals shared by Jesus were not without controversy. Rev. Colby will preach on a story

from Luke 15 (15:1-10) that begins with complaints being lodged about the company with whom Jesus shares meals.

Rev. David Colby preaches and Central Choir sings.

# SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 22

Rev. Ashley Bair will preach on Luke 16:1-13. What does Jesus say about our relationship with money? In a society where money is considered both a blessing and a curse, yet necessary for survival, how are we being faithful stewards with our dollars?

The Central Choir sings, and we are joined by Mark Doerr who plays the vielle à roue (we know this as a Hurdy Gurdy in English). Following worship, our first rehearsal of the year for the Chamber Ensemble.

## SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 29

Jesus lived during a period of intense social stratification. And in a memorable teaching, Jesus told the story of a rich man and a poor man. In a surprising gospel twist, we never learn the name of the rich man, but instead come to see the world through poor Lazarus' eyes (Luke 16:19-31). Rev. Colby will preach on The Great Chasm.

#### CENTRAL CHOIR

Who: Adults

What: An SATB Choir that sings in worship nearly every week, September – May. While reading music isn't required, this choir moves quickly, learns a lot of repertoire, and throughout the year sings some challenging music (as well as more accessible music).

When: Rehearsals are Wednesdays from 7:15 p.m. to 9:15 p.m.

We sing most Sundays, and usually gather at 9:30 a.m. for warm-ups and rehearsal.

# STICKS AND STEEL 1

Who: Children grades 3 – 5

What: This is the entry-level group for our Percussion Ensemble. We will learn how to play various percussion instruments and hand chimes, and play in worship occasionally throughout the year.

When: We will have two dates in which we share in worship and additional dates preparing for them.

Sticks & Steel 1 - Rehearse Jan. 12 and 19 after church. Rehearse Jan. 26 before church, then play in worship.

Sticks & Steel 1 AND 2 - Rehearse May 31 and June 7 after church, June 14 before church, then play in worship.

# STICKS AND STEEL 2

Who: Middle School and High School Youth

What: This is the advanced Youth Percussion Ensemble. We will play more difficult music, while exploring the unique sounds of the marimba, glockenspiel, chimes, bells, drums, and auxiliary percussion.

When: We will have three dates in which we share in worship and additional dates preparing for them.

Sticks and Steel 2 - Rehearse Nov. 3 and 10 after church, Nov. 17 before church, then play in that day's worship.

Sticks and Steel 2 - Rehearse Feb. 23 and March 1 after church, March 8 before church, then play in worship.

Sticks & Steel 1 AND 2 - Rehearse May 31 and June 7 after church, June 14 before church, then play in worship.

# C H A M B E R E N S E M B L E

Who: Open to adult and youth (grade 8 and up) instrumentalists (traditional band and orchestra instruments) who have played their instrument for at least 3 years.

What: We play chamber music for

orchestral and band instruments.

When: We rehearse after worship for 30 minutes and play in worship about once per month. Our first rehearsal is Sept. 22 at 11:45 a.m.

In order to have music ready for you, please contact Jennifer Anderson several days in advance of when you plan to join us.

#### BELL ENSEMBLE

Who: Adults and high school youth who have music reading skills and can play independently. Not a group suited for beginners (though if there is enough interest, we may add a second group in the future!) This group will experiment with sounds and timbres and use repertoire that stretches the limits of what we think of as bell choir music. Come and experiment with us!

When: Tuesday nights at 7:00 p.m. starting September. (May be moving to 7:15 p.m. in November. Or first Sunday to ring in worship is September 8!

Because there is a lot of interest in this group, another more traditional bell choir may be added on Tuesday nights at 6:30 p.m. Stay tuned! If you are interested in either group, please speak with Jennifer Anderson.



# CHILDREN & YOUTH EDUCATION

## CONFIRMATION CLASS

In the Presbyterian tradition, we practice infant baptism, meaning that families and faith communities make commitments to nurture the faith of infants. As those children grow, they have the opportunity to participate in confirmation, in which they learn more about the Presbyterian tradition and can make the decision to publicly profess their faith to become members of the church. Confirmands get to experience a reaffirmation of their baptism and the promises that their faith community made at their baptism.

At Central, we hold confirmation classes every few years based on our numbers. Many churches hold classes for late middle/early high schoolers, but the specific age is less important than the commitment of the group to meeting and learning together. In the 2019-2020 school year, confirmation at Central is open to 8th and 9th graders, as well as any older youth who have not had the opportunity to participate in a class. The class will meet regularly throughout the program year to get to know one another, ask tough questions about their faith, learn about the Christian tradition, and learn about the life of the church at Central.

The class will be led by the Children and Youth Ministries Coordinator, Katie Morris, along with Pastors Ashley and Dave, and other folks who participate in the life of the church at Central. The confirmation process is a church-wide process, as part of the covenant we make at baptism, and we want to celebrate the challenging work the confirmands do in examining their faiths. If you have questions about confirmation, are interested in participating as a confirmand this year, or are interested in adult leadership, contact Katie Morris.

#### CHILDCARE


